1 Strike everything after the enacting clause and insert:

2 "Section 1. Section 8-358, Arizona Revised Statutes, is amended to  
3 read:

4 8-358. Juvenile intensive probation guidelines; report

5 A. The supreme court shall establish juvenile intensive probation  
6 guidelines. In establishing these guidelines, the supreme court shall ensure  
7 that both:

8 1. Juveniles who are granted intensive probation meet the requirements  
9 of section 8-352.

10 2. Based on the nature of the offense and the delinquent history of  
11 the juvenile, there are reasonable grounds to believe that the juvenile is  
12 able to remain at liberty without posing a substantial risk to the community.

13 B. The supreme court shall annually submit a report stating the number  
14 of juveniles supervised on intensive probation during the prior year, the  
15 nature of the offense and the delinquent history of each of these juveniles  
16 to the governor, the speaker of the house of representatives and the  
17 president of the senate at the time of its annual budget request. **BEGINNING**  
18 **JULY 1, 2011, THE REPORT SHALL BE SUBMITTED ELECTRONICALLY.**

19 C. The supreme court shall contract for an evaluation to determine if  
20 the provisions of this article reduce the number of serious repetitive  
21 offenses committed by juveniles on intensive probation supervision and shall  
22 submit the results of the study to the governor, the speaker of the house of  
23 representatives and the president of the senate.

24 Sec. 2. Section 12-114.01, Arizona Revised Statutes, is amended to  
25 read:

26 12-114.01. Probation surcharge; deposit

27 A. Except as provided in section 12-269, in addition to any other  
28 penalty assessment provided by law, a probation surcharge of ~~ten~~ **TWENTY**  
29 dollars shall be levied on every fine, penalty and forfeiture imposed and

1 collected by the superior, justice and municipal courts for criminal offenses  
2 and any civil penalty imposed and collected for a civil traffic violation and  
3 fine, penalty or forfeiture for a violation of the motor vehicle statutes,  
4 for a violation of any local ordinance relating to the stopping, standing or  
5 operation of a vehicle, except parking violations, or for a violation of the  
6 game and fish statutes in title 17.

7 B. The monies collected pursuant to this section shall be deposited,  
8 pursuant to sections 35-146 and 35-147, in the judicial collection  
9 enhancement fund established by section 12-113 to be used to supplement  
10 monies currently used for the salaries of adult and juvenile probation and  
11 surveillance officers and for support of programs and services of the  
12 superior court adult and juvenile probation departments.

13 C. The court may waive all or part of a probation surcharge in the  
14 same manner and subject to the same limitations provided for the waiver of  
15 penalty assessments in section 12-116.01, subsection ~~E~~ F and section  
16 12-116.02, subsection D.

17 Sec. 3. Section 12-251, Arizona Revised Statutes, is amended to read:

18 12-251. Adult probation officers and support staff; appointment;  
19 qualifications

20 A. The presiding judge of the superior court in each county shall  
21 appoint a chief adult probation officer who shall serve at the pleasure of  
22 the presiding judge. Such chief adult probation officer, with the approval  
23 of the presiding judge of the superior court, shall appoint such deputy adult  
24 probation officers and support staff as are necessary to provide presentence  
25 investigations and supervision services to the court. Presentence  
26 investigations and probation services may be provided to the justice courts  
27 in each county for persons who are convicted of violating section 28-1381 or  
28 28-1382 or title 13, chapter 14, 35.1 or 36 and who are placed on supervised  
29 probation by the court. Presentence investigations and supervised probation  
30 services may be provided by a county probation office to a municipal court  
31 through an intergovernmental agreement entered into by the respective county  
32 and municipality. On approval of the presiding judge and in accordance with

1 policies and procedures developed by the supreme court, the presiding judge  
2 of the superior court may direct that presentence investigations and  
3 supervised probation services be provided for other persons if a risk of  
4 violence exists or if it would be in the best interest of justice. Those  
5 deputy adult probation officers engaged in case supervision shall supervise  
6 no more than an average of ~~sixty~~ SIXTY-FIVE adults who reside in the county  
7 on probation to the court. Such deputy adult probation officers shall hold  
8 office under rules and procedures established by the supreme court.

9 B. Each adult probation officer appointed pursuant to subsection A of  
10 this section shall give bond in the principal amount to be fixed by the court  
11 and approved by the judge making the appointment, conditioned upon the  
12 faithful performance by such officer of the officer's official duties and the  
13 payment of all monies coming into the officer's possession as such officer to  
14 the person, officer or body entitled to receive the monies. Any adult  
15 probation officer covered by a blanket faithful performance bond payable to  
16 the county or covered by state risk management shall be deemed to be in  
17 compliance with this section.

18 C. Probation department personnel shall qualify under minimum  
19 standards of experience and education established by the supreme court. Such  
20 standards may differ for counties of less than three hundred thousand persons  
21 from counties with three hundred thousand persons or more. Notwithstanding  
22 section 12-265, any additional salary costs that might be required as a  
23 result of the adoption of minimum salary standards by the supreme court may  
24 be paid by funds made available to the probation department pursuant to  
25 sections 12-267 and 12-268 or by the supreme court.

26 D. Presently appointed adult probation officers who qualify under ~~the~~  
27 ~~provisions of~~ subsection C of this section shall be retained in their  
28 position as long as they are qualified.

29 Sec. 4. Section 12-299.03, Arizona Revised Statutes, is amended to  
30 read:

31 12-299.03. Duties of the supreme court; evaluation

32 A. The supreme court shall:

- 1           1. Implement and administer the community punishment program.
- 2           2. Adopt necessary guidelines, rules, standards and policies to
- 3 implement this article.
- 4           3. Facilitate the development of local plans.
- 5           4. Develop and implement an application process and procedures.
- 6           5. Review and approve plans and budgets.
- 7           6. Allocate funding.
- 8           7. Provide statewide training and technical assistance to the superior
- 9 court, adult probation departments and advisory committees regarding
- 10 community punishment.

11           8. Conduct an evaluation of all programs on a periodic basis to ensure  
12 program accountability. The evaluation report shall include information for  
13 the superior court in each participating county on the number of offenders  
14 serving suspended sentences on probation and intensive probation, the average  
15 cost per offender, the amount of restitution, fines and fees paid, the number  
16 of community restitution hours contributed by offenders and the number of  
17 offenders who have successfully completed terms of probation. The report  
18 shall be submitted to the governor, the speaker of the house of  
19 representatives and the president of the senate. The supreme court may  
20 contract with a private consultant to prepare this evaluation report.  
21 **BEGINNING JULY 1, 2011, THE REPORT SHALL BE SUBMITTED ELECTRONICALLY.**

22           B. The supreme court may contract directly with private human service  
23 agencies to develop, implement and operate community punishment programs.

24           Sec. 5. Section 12-2456, Arizona Revised Statutes, is amended to read:  
25 12-2456. Emancipation administrative costs fund; purpose;  
26 report; collection of information

27           A. Each county treasurer shall establish an emancipation  
28 administrative costs fund consisting of monies received pursuant to section  
29 12-284, subsection J.

30           B. The presiding judge of the juvenile court shall use fund monies for  
31 administrative costs associated with this article.

1 C. On notice of the presiding judge, the county treasurer shall invest  
2 monies in the fund and monies earned from investment shall be credited to the  
3 fund.

4 D. On or before November 15 of each year, the county treasurer shall  
5 submit a report to the presiding judge that shows the amount of monies in the  
6 fund. BEGINNING JULY 1, 2011, THE REPORT SHALL BE SUBMITTED ELECTRONICALLY.

7 E. Beginning October 1, 2005, the administrative office of the courts  
8 shall collect information relating to emancipation of minors pursuant to this  
9 ~~title~~ CHAPTER, including the following:

10 1. The number of petitions filed, by age and county of residence.

11 2. The number of petitions granted, by age and county of residence.

12 F. The administrative office of the courts shall include the  
13 information collected pursuant to subsection E of this section in the annual  
14 report of the judicial department.

15 Sec. 6. Section 13-901.02, Arizona Revised Statutes, is amended to  
16 read:

17 13-901.02. Drug treatment and education fund

18 A. The drug treatment and education fund is established. The  
19 administrative office of the supreme court shall administer the fund.

20 B. Fifty per cent of the monies deposited in the drug treatment and  
21 education fund shall be distributed by the administrative office of the  
22 supreme court to the superior court probation departments to cover the costs  
23 of placing persons in drug education and treatment programs administered by a  
24 qualified agency or organization that provides such programs to persons who  
25 abuse controlled substances. Such monies shall be allocated to superior  
26 court probation departments according to a formula based on probation  
27 caseload to be established by the administrative office of the supreme court.

28 C. Fifty per cent of the monies deposited in the drug treatment and  
29 education fund shall be distributed to the Arizona parents commission on drug  
30 education and prevention established by section 41-1604.17.

31 D. The administrative office of the supreme court shall cause to be  
32 prepared at the end of each fiscal year after 1997 an accountability report

1 card that details the cost savings realized from the diversion of persons  
2 from prisons to probation. A copy of the report shall be submitted to the  
3 governor and the legislature, and a copy of the report shall be sent to each  
4 public library in the state. BEGINNING JULY 1, 2011, THE REPORT SHALL BE  
5 SUBMITTED ELECTRONICALLY. The administrative office of the supreme court  
6 shall receive reimbursement from the drug treatment and education fund for  
7 any administrative costs it incurs in the implementation of this section.

8 Sec. 7. Section 13-914, Arizona Revised Statutes, is amended to read:  
9 13-914. Intensive probation; evaluation; sentence; criteria;  
10 limit; conditions

11 A. An adult probation officer shall prepare a presentence report for  
12 every offender who has either:

13 1. Been convicted of a felony and for whom the granting of probation  
14 is not prohibited by law.

15 2. Violated probation by commission of a technical violation that was  
16 not chargeable or indictable as a criminal offense.

17 B. The adult probation officer shall evaluate the needs of the  
18 offender and the offender's risk to the community, including the nature of  
19 the offense and criminal history of the offender. If the nature of the  
20 offense and the prior criminal history of the offender indicate that the  
21 offender should be included in an intensive probation program pursuant to  
22 supreme court guidelines for intensive probation, the adult probation officer  
23 may recommend to the court that the offender be granted intensive probation.

24 C. The court may suspend the imposition or execution of the sentence  
25 and grant the offender a period of intensive probation in accordance with  
26 this chapter. Except for sentences that are imposed pursuant to section  
27 13-3601, the sentence is tentative to the extent that it may be altered or  
28 revoked pursuant to this chapter, but for all other purposes it is a final  
29 judgment of conviction. This subsection does not preclude the court from  
30 imposing a term of intensive probation pursuant to section 13-3601.

31 D. When granting intensive probation the court shall set forth on the  
32 record the factual and legal reasons in support of the sentence.

1 E. Intensive probation shall be conditioned on the offender:

2 1. Maintaining employment or maintaining full-time student status at a  
3 school subject to title 15 or title 32, chapter 30 and making progress deemed  
4 satisfactory to the probation officer, or both, or being involved in  
5 supervised job searches and community restitution work at least six days a  
6 week throughout the offender's term of intensive probation.

7 2. Paying restitution and probation fees of not less than ~~fifty~~  
8 ~~SEVENTY-FIVE~~ dollars unless, after determining the inability of the offender  
9 to pay the fee, the court assesses a lesser fee. Probation fees shall be  
10 deposited in the adult probation services fund established by section 12-267.  
11 Any amount ~~greater than forty dollars of the fee~~ assessed pursuant to this  
12 ~~subsection~~ PARAGRAPH shall ~~only~~ be used to supplement monies ~~currently~~ used  
13 for the salaries of adult probation and surveillance officers and for support  
14 of programs and services of the superior court adult probation departments.

15 3. Establishing a residence at a place approved by the intensive  
16 probation team and not changing the offender's residence without the team's  
17 prior approval.

18 4. Remaining at the offender's place of residence at all times except  
19 to go to work, to attend school, to perform community restitution and as  
20 specifically allowed in each instance by the adult probation officer.

21 5. Allowing administration of drug and alcohol tests if requested by a  
22 member of the intensive probation team.

23 6. Performing not less than forty hours of community restitution each  
24 month. Full-time students may be exempted or required to perform fewer hours  
25 of community restitution. For good cause, the court may reduce the number of  
26 community restitution hours performed to not less than twenty hours each  
27 month.

28 7. Meeting any other conditions imposed by the court to meet the needs  
29 of the offender and limit the risks to the community, including participation  
30 in a program of community punishment authorized in title 12, chapter 2,  
31 article 11.

1           Sec. 8. Section 13-916, Arizona Revised Statutes, is amended to read:

2           13-916. Intensive probation teams; adult probation officer  
3                                   qualifications; duties; case load limit

4           A. The chief adult probation officer in each county, with approval of  
5 the presiding judge of the superior court, shall appoint intensive probation  
6 teams consisting of one adult probation officer and one surveillance officer,  
7 **TWO ADULT PROBATION OFFICERS** or one adult probation officer and two  
8 surveillance officers.

9           B. A two person intensive probation team shall supervise no more than  
10 twenty-five persons at one time, and a three person intensive probation team  
11 shall supervise no more than forty persons at one time.

12           C. The adult probation officers shall meet the bonding requirements  
13 and experience and education standards established pursuant to section  
14 12-251.

15           D. The intensive probation team may serve warrants on, make arrests of  
16 and bring before the court persons who have violated the terms of intensive  
17 probation.

18           E. The adult probation and surveillance officers both have the  
19 authority of a peace officer in the performance of their duties but are not  
20 eligible to participate in the public safety personnel retirement system.

21           F. The intensive probation team shall:

22           1. Secure and keep a complete identification record of each person  
23 supervised by the team and a written statement of the conditions of the  
24 probation.

25           2. Exercise close supervision and observation over persons sentenced  
26 to intensive probation including both of the following:

27                   (a) Visual contact with each probationer at least four times per week.

28                   (b) Weekly contact with the employer of the probationer.

29           3. Obtain and assemble information concerning the conduct of persons  
30 sentenced to intensive probation, including weekly arrest records, and report  
31 the information to the court.



1           4. Report to the court if the probationer engages in conduct  
2           constituting an offense.

3           5. Bring a defaulting probationer into court if, in the judgment of  
4           the adult probation officer, the probationer's conduct justifies revoking the  
5           intensive probation.

6           6. Monitor the payment of restitution and probation fees and bring  
7           into court any probationer who fails to pay restitution or fees.

8           7. Perform any other responsibilities required by the terms and  
9           conditions imposed by the court.

10          Sec. 9. Section 21-222, Arizona Revised Statutes, is amended to read:

11          21-222. Arizona lengthy trial fund

12          A. The Arizona lengthy trial fund is established consisting of monies  
13          received from the additional fees paid on all filings, appearances, responses  
14          and answers pursuant to section 12-115. The monies in the fund shall not be  
15          used for any purpose other than as prescribed in this section.

16          B. The supreme court shall administer the fund and shall adopt rules  
17          for the administration of the fund. Not more than three per cent of the  
18          monies in the fund shall be used for the reasonable and necessary costs of  
19          administering the fund. On or before the fifteenth day of each month, on  
20          receipt of a request for reimbursement the supreme court shall transmit  
21          monies from the fund to a jury commissioner for monies paid to a juror under  
22          this section, together with a fee of not less than the amount prescribed in  
23          section 12-284, subsection A, class E for each application for payment of  
24          replacement or supplemental earnings by a juror.

25          C. Subject to the availability of monies, monies in the fund shall be  
26          used to pay full or partial earnings replacement or supplementation to jurors  
27          who serve as petit jurors for more than five days and who receive less than  
28          full compensation. The amount of replacement or supplemental earnings shall  
29          be at least forty dollars but not more than three hundred dollars per day per  
30          juror beginning on the fourth day of jury service.

31          D. A juror whose jury service lasts more than five days may submit a  
32          request for payment from the fund. The amount a juror receives from the fund

1 is limited to the difference between the jury fee prescribed in section  
2 21-221 and the actual amount of earnings a juror earns, not less than forty  
3 dollars, up to the maximum level payable under subsection C of this section,  
4 minus any amount the juror actually received from the juror's employer during  
5 the same time period. A juror who requests payment from the fund:

6 1. Shall disclose on the form the juror's regular earnings, the amount  
7 the juror's employer will pay during the term of jury service starting on the  
8 fourth day and thereafter, the amount of replacement or supplemental earnings  
9 being requested and any other information that the jury commissioner deems  
10 necessary.

11 2. Before receiving payment from the fund, shall submit verification  
12 from the juror's employer, if any, regarding the earnings information that is  
13 provided under paragraph 1. This verification may include the employee's  
14 most recent earnings statement or a similar document.

15 3. In order to verify the weekly income if the juror is self-employed  
16 or receives compensation other than wages, shall provide a sworn affidavit  
17 attesting to the juror's approximate gross weekly income, together with any  
18 other information that the supreme court requires.

19 E. Jurors who are unemployed and are not eligible for payment pursuant  
20 to subsections C and D of this section are eligible to be paid forty dollars  
21 per day, even if they receive income in the form of spousal maintenance,  
22 pensions, retirement, unemployment compensation, disability benefits or other  
23 similar income. Commissioners shall not deduct these other forms of income  
24 in calculating the amount these jurors are to be paid from the fund.

25 F. The supreme court shall annually report to the joint legislative  
26 budget committee on the amount of monies collected and disbursed from the  
27 fund and the number of jurors who received monies from the fund. **BEGINNING**  
28 **JULY 1, 2011, THE REPORT SHALL BE SUBMITTED ELECTRONICALLY.**

1           Sec. 10. Section 25-323.01, Arizona Revised Statutes, is amended to  
2 read:

3           25-323.01. Child support committee; membership; duties; report

4           A. The child support committee is established consisting of the  
5 following members:

6           1. The director of the department of economic security or the  
7 director's designee.

8           2. The assistant director of the division of child support enforcement  
9 of the department of economic security.

10          3. A division or section chief from the office of the attorney general  
11 who has knowledge of or experience in child support enforcement and related  
12 issues and who is appointed by the attorney general.

13          4. The director of the administrative office of the supreme court or  
14 the director's designee.

15          5. Two presiding judges from the domestic relations division of the  
16 superior court who are appointed by the chief justice of the supreme court.  
17 One judge shall be from an urban county and one judge shall be from a rural  
18 county.

19          6. A title IV-D court commissioner who is appointed by the chief  
20 justice of the supreme court.

21          7. A clerk of the superior court who is appointed by the chief justice  
22 of the supreme court.

23          8. One county attorney who is appointed by the director of the  
24 department of economic security and who is from a county that is currently  
25 contracting with the state to provide child support enforcement services.

26          9. An executive assistant from the office of the governor who is  
27 appointed by the governor.

28          10. One person who is knowledgeable in child support issues and who is  
29 a noncustodial parent and one person who is knowledgeable in child support  
30 issues and who is a custodial parent. The president of the senate shall  
31 appoint these members.

1           11. One person who is knowledgeable in child support issues and who is  
2 a noncustodial parent and one person who is knowledgeable in child support  
3 issues and who is a custodial parent. The speaker of the house of  
4 representatives shall appoint these members.

5           12. One parent who is knowledgeable in child support issues, who has  
6 joint custody and who is appointed jointly by the president of the senate and  
7 the speaker of the house of representatives.

8           13. One person from the executive committee of the family law section  
9 of the state bar of Arizona who is appointed by the chief justice of the  
10 supreme court.

11           14. One person from the business community who is appointed jointly by  
12 the president of the senate and the speaker of the house of representatives.

13           15. Two members of the senate from different political parties. The  
14 president of the senate shall appoint the members and designate one of the  
15 members as the cochairperson.

16           16. Two members of the house of representatives from different  
17 political parties. The speaker of the house of representatives shall appoint  
18 the members and designate one of the members as the cochairperson.

19           B. The committee shall prepare an annual written report on its work,  
20 findings and recommendations regarding child support guidelines, enforcement  
21 and related issues. The committee shall submit this report to the governor,  
22 the president of the senate, the speaker of the house of representatives and  
23 the chief justice of the supreme court on or before December 31 of each year  
24 and shall provide a copy of this report to the secretary of state and the  
25 director of the Arizona state library, archives and public records.  
26 **BEGINNING JULY 1, 2011, THE REPORT SHALL BE SUBMITTED ELECTRONICALLY.**

27           C. Nonlegislative members of the committee are not eligible to receive  
28 compensation but are eligible for reimbursement of expenses pursuant to title  
29 38, chapter 4, article 2.

1           Sec. 11. Section 25-323.02, Arizona Revised Statutes, is amended to  
2 read:

3           25-323.02. Domestic relations committee; membership; duties;  
4                                   pilot programs; report

5           A. The domestic relations committee is established consisting of the  
6 following members:

7           1. Two noncustodial parents who are knowledgeable in domestic  
8 relations issues and who are not judges or commissioners. The president of  
9 the senate and the speaker of the house of representatives shall each appoint  
10 one of these members.

11           2. Two custodial parents who are knowledgeable in domestic relations  
12 issues and who are not judges or commissioners. The president of the senate  
13 and the speaker of the house of representatives shall each appoint one of  
14 these members.

15           3. Two parents who have joint custody, who are knowledgeable in  
16 domestic relations issues and who are not judges or commissioners. The  
17 president of the senate and the speaker of the house of representatives shall  
18 each appoint one of these members.

19           4. Two parents who are knowledgeable in domestic relations issues, who  
20 are not judges or commissioners and who are appointed by the governor.

21           5. Two active or retired judges or commissioners, or both, from the  
22 domestic relations department of the superior court who are appointed by the  
23 chief justice of the supreme court. One of these members shall be from an  
24 urban county and one member shall be from a rural county.

25           6. One domestic relations attorney who is appointed by the governor.

26           7. One clerk of the superior court who is appointed by the chief  
27 justice of the supreme court.

28           8. A professional domestic relations mediator who is appointed by the  
29 president of the senate.

30           9. A psychologist who is experienced in performing child custody  
31 evaluations and who is appointed by the speaker of the house of  
32 representatives.

1           10. A domestic relations educator who is experienced in matters  
2 relating to parenting or divorce classes and who is appointed by the  
3 governor.

4           11. A representative of a statewide domestic violence coalition who is  
5 appointed by the president of the senate.

6           12. A representative of a conciliation court who is appointed by the  
7 chief justice of the supreme court.

8           13. A marriage and family therapist who is knowledgeable in domestic  
9 relations issues and who is appointed by the speaker of the house of  
10 representatives.

11           14. A representative from a faith-based organization who is  
12 knowledgeable in domestic relations issues and who is appointed by the  
13 governor.

14           15. An administrative officer of the supreme court who is appointed by  
15 the chief justice of the supreme court or the officer's designee.

16           16. A member of a law enforcement agency in this state who is appointed  
17 by the speaker of the house of representatives.

18           17. A member of an agency that advocates for children who is appointed  
19 by the president of the senate.

20           18. One member of the family law section of the state bar of Arizona  
21 who is appointed by the chief justice of the supreme court.

22           19. Four members of the senate, not more than two of whom are members  
23 of the same political party. The president of the senate shall appoint these  
24 members and shall designate one of them as the cochairperson.

25           20. Four members of the house of representatives, not more than two of  
26 whom are members of the same political party. The speaker of the house of  
27 representatives shall appoint these members and designate one of them as the  
28 cochairperson.

29           B. The committee shall prepare a statewide plan for an integrated  
30 family court with comprehensive subject matter jurisdiction over all matters  
31 involving the family and submit this plan to the governor, the president of  
32 the senate, the speaker of the house of representatives and the chief justice

1 of the supreme court on or before December 31, 2002. Based on this plan or  
2 on other formal recommendations from the committee, beginning July 1, 2006,  
3 the supreme court shall implement a two year integrated family court pilot  
4 program in one county with a population of less than five hundred thousand  
5 persons. The supreme court shall submit quarterly reports on the pilot  
6 program to the committee. The committee shall include information from these  
7 reports in its annual report prepared pursuant to subsection C of this  
8 section.

9 C. The committee shall prepare an annual written report regarding  
10 recommended changes to the domestic relations statutes, rules and procedures  
11 and other related issues designed to lead to a reform of the state's domestic  
12 relations statutes. The committee shall submit this report to the governor,  
13 the president of the senate, the speaker of the house of representatives and  
14 the chief justice of the supreme court on or before December 31 of each year  
15 and shall provide a copy of the report to the secretary of state and the  
16 director of the Arizona state library, archives and public records.  
17 **BEGINNING JULY 1, 2011, THE REPORT SHALL BE SUBMITTED ELECTRONICALLY.**

18 D. The committee shall develop minimum training standards on domestic  
19 violence and child abuse issues for persons conducting an investigation or  
20 preparing a report concerning child custodial arrangements pursuant to

24           In this article, unless the context otherwise requires:

25           1. "Accidental disability" means a physical or mental condition that  
26 the local board finds totally and permanently prevents an employee from  
27 performing a reasonable range of duties within the employee's job  
28 classification and that was incurred in the performance of the employee's  
29 duty.

30           2. "Accumulated contributions" means, for each member, the sum of the  
31 amount of the member's aggregate contributions made to the fund and the  
32 amount, if any, attributable to the employee's contributions prior to the

1 member's effective date under another public retirement system, other than  
2 the federal social security act, and transferred to the fund minus the  
3 benefits paid to or on behalf of the member.

4 3. "Actuarial equivalent" means equality in present value of the

10 REIMBURSES THE EMPLOYER FOR THE WORK PERFORMED BY THE EMPLOYEE FOR THAT THIRD  
11 PARTY, EXCEPT FOR THIRD PARTY CONTRACTS BETWEEN PUBLIC AGENCIES FOR LAW  
12 ENFORCEMENT, TRAINING, WILDFIRE AND EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT ACTIVITIES. For the  
13 purposes of this paragraph, "base salary" means the amount of compensation  
14 each employee is regularly paid for personal services rendered to an employer  
15 before the addition of any extra monies, including overtime pay, shift  
16 differential pay, holiday pay, longevity pay, fringe benefit pay and similar

18 11. "Credited service" means the member's total period of service prior  
19 to the member's effective date of participation, plus those compensated  
20 periods of the member's service thereafter for which the member made

22 12. "Cure period" means the ninety-day period in which a participant or  
23 alternate payee may submit an amended domestic relations order and request a  
24 determination, calculated from the time the system issues a determination

27 13. "Depository" means a bank in which all monies of the system are  
28 deposited and held and from which all expenditures for benefits, expenses and

31 participant and alternate payee whether a domestic relations order qualifies  
32 as a plan approved domestic relations order.

1           15. "Determination period" means the ninety-day period in which the  
2 system must review a domestic relations order that is submitted by a  
3 participant or alternate payee to determine whether the domestic relations  
4 order qualifies as a plan approved domestic relations order, calculated from  
5 the time the system mails a notice of receipt to the participant and  
6 alternate payee.

7           16. "Domestic relations order" means an order of a court of this state  
8 that is made pursuant to the domestic relations laws of this state and that  
9 creates or recognizes the existence of an alternate payee's right to, or  
10 assigns to an alternate payee the right to, receive a portion of the benefits

26           (b) Municipal fire fighters.

27           (c) Paid full-time fire fighters employed directly by a fire district  
28 organized pursuant to section 48-803 or 48-804 with three or more full-time  
29 fire fighters, but not including fire fighters employed by a fire district  
30 pursuant to a contract with a corporation.

31           (d) State highway patrol officers who are certified peace officers.

32           (e) State fire fighters.

1 (f) County sheriffs and deputies who are certified peace officers.

2 (g) Game and fish wardens who are certified peace officers.

3 (h) Police officers who are certified peace officers and fire fighters  
4 of a nonprofit corporation operating a public airport pursuant to sections  
5 28-8423 and 28-8424. A police officer shall be designated pursuant to  
6 section 28-8426 to aid and supplement state and local law enforcement  
7 agencies and a fire fighter's sole duty shall be to perform fire fighting  
8 services, including services required by federal regulations.

9 (i) Police officers who are certified peace officers and who are  
10 appointed by the Arizona board of regents.

11 (j) Police officers who are certified peace officers and who are  
12 appointed by a community college district governing board.

13 (k) State attorney general investigators who are certified peace  
14 officers.

15 (l) County attorney investigators who are certified peace officers.

16 (m) Police officers who are certified peace officers and who are  
17 employed by an Indian reservation police agency.

18 (n) Fire fighters who are employed by an Indian reservation fire  
19 fighting agency.

20 (o) Police officers who are certified peace officers and who are  
21 appointed by the department of administration.

22 (p) Department of liquor licenses and control investigators who are  
23 certified peace officers.

24 (q) Arizona department of agriculture officers who are certified peace  
25 officers.

26 (r) Arizona state parks board rangers and managers who are certified  
27 peace officers.

28 (s) County park rangers who are certified peace officers.

29 21. "Employee" means any person who is employed by a participating  
30 employer and who is a member of an eligible group but does not include any  
31 persons compensated on a contractual or fee basis. If an eligible group  
32 requires certified peace officer status and at the option of the local board,

1 employee may include a person who is training to become a certified peace  
2 officer.

3 22. "Employers" means:

4 (a) Cities contributing to the fire fighters' relief and pension fund  
5 as provided in sections 9-951 through 9-971 or statutes amended thereby and  
6 antecedent thereto, as of June 30, 1968 on behalf of their full-time paid  
7 fire fighters.

8 (b) Cities contributing under the state police pension laws as  
9 provided in sections 9-911 through 9-934 or statutes amended thereby and

12 (c) The state highway patrol covered under the state highway patrol  
13 retirement system.

14 (d) The state, or any political subdivision of this state, including

17 participate in the system on behalf of an eligible group of public safety

22 23. "Fund" means the public safety personnel retirement fund, which is  
23 the fund established to receive and invest contributions accumulated under  
24 the system and from which benefits are paid.

25 24. "Fund manager" means the fund manager of the system, who are the  
26 persons appointed to invest and operate the fund.

27 25. "Local board" means the retirement board of the employer, who are  
28 the persons appointed to administer the system as it applies to their members  
29 in the system.

30 26. "Member" means any employee who meets all of the following  
31 qualifications:

1           (a) Who is either a full-time paid municipal police officer, a  
2 full-time paid fire fighter, a law enforcement officer who is employed by  
3 this state including the director thereof, a state fire fighter who is  
4 primarily assigned to fire fighting duties, a fire fighter or police officer  
5 of a nonprofit corporation operating a public airport pursuant to sections  
6 28-8423 and 28-8424, all ranks designated by the Arizona law enforcement  
7 merit system council, a state attorney general investigator who is a  
8 certified peace officer, a county attorney investigator who is a certified  
9 peace officer, a police officer who is appointed by the department of

23           (c) Whose employment with an employer commenced prior to attainment of  
24 age fifty.

25           (d) Whose customary employment is at least forty hours per week and  
26 for more than six months in a calendar year.

27           (e) Who has not attained age sixty-five prior to the employee's  
28 effective date of participation or who was over age sixty-five with  
29 twenty-five years or more of service prior to the employee's effective date  
30 of participation.

31           27. "Normal retirement date" means the first day of the calendar month  
32 immediately following an employee's completion of twenty years of service or

1 the employee's sixty-second birthday and the employee's completion of fifteen  
2 years of service.

3 28. "Notice of receipt" means a written document that is issued by the  
4 system to a participant and alternate payee and that states that the system  
5 has received a domestic relations order and a request for a determination  
6 that the domestic relations order is a plan approved domestic relations  
7 order.

8 29. "Ordinary disability" means a physical condition that the local  
9 board determines will prevent an employee totally and permanently from  
10 performing a reasonable range of duties within the employee's department or a  
11 mental condition that the local board determines will prevent an employee  
12 totally and permanently from engaging in any substantial gainful activity.

13 30. "Participant" means a member who is subject to a domestic relations  
14 order.

15 31. "Participant's portion" means benefits that are payable to a  
16 participant pursuant to a plan approved domestic relations order.

17 32. "Pension" means a series of monthly amounts that are payable to a  
18 person who is entitled to receive benefits under the plan.

19 33. "Personal representative" means the personal representative of a  
20 deceased alternate payee.

21 34. "Plan approved domestic relations order" means a domestic relations  
22 order that the system approves as meeting all the requirements for a plan  
23 approved domestic relations order as otherwise prescribed in this article.

24 35. "Regularly assigned to hazardous duty" means regularly assigned to  
25 duties of the type normally expected of municipal police officers, municipal  
26 or state fire fighters, eligible fire district fire fighters, state highway  
27 patrol officers, county sheriffs and deputies, fish and game wardens, fire  
28 fighters and police officers of a nonprofit corporation operating a public  
29 airport pursuant to sections 28-8423 and 28-8424, police officers who are  
30 appointed by the Arizona board of regents or a community college district  
31 governing board, state attorney general investigators who are certified peace  
32 officers, county attorney investigators who are certified peace officers,



1 police officers who are appointed by the department of administration and who  
2 are certified peace officers, department of liquor licenses and control  
3 investigators who are certified peace officers, Arizona department of  
4 agriculture officers who are certified peace officers, Arizona state parks  
5 board rangers and managers who are certified peace officers, county park  
6 rangers who are certified peace officers, police officers who are certified  
7 peace officers and who are employed by an Indian reservation police agency or  
8 fire fighters who are employed by an Indian reservation fire fighting agency.  
9 Those individuals who are assigned solely to support duties such as

17 36. "Retirement" means termination of employment after a member has  
18 fulfilled all requirements for a pension. Retirement shall be considered as  
19 commencing on the first day of the month immediately following a member's  
20 last day of employment or authorized leave of absence, if later.

21 37. "Segregated funds" means the amount of benefits that would  
22 currently be payable to an alternate payee pursuant to a domestic relations  
23 order under review by the system, or a domestic relations order submitted to  
24 the system that failed to qualify as a plan approved domestic relations  
25 order, if the domestic relations order were determined to be a plan approved  
26 domestic relations order.

27 38. "Service" means the last period of continuous employment of an  
28 employee by the employers prior to the employee's retirement or the  
29 employee's sixty-fifth birthday, whichever first occurs, except that if such  
30 period includes employment during which the employee would not have qualified  
31 as a member had the system then been effective, such as employment as a

19 41. "Temporary disability" means a physical or mental condition that  
20 the local board finds totally and temporarily prevents an employee from  
21 performing a reasonable range of duties within the employee's department and  
22 that was incurred in the performance of the employee's duty.

23 Sec. 16. Section 38-902, Arizona Revised Statutes, is amended to read:

24 38-902. Joinder agreement

25 A. County detention officers and nonuniformed employees of a sheriff's  
26 department whose primary duties require direct contact with inmates may  
27 participate in this plan if the board of supervisors of the county enters  
28 into a joinder agreement with the fund manager to bring such employees into  
29 this plan. The joinder agreement shall be in accordance with the provisions  
30 of this plan. All such employees shall be designated for membership in the  
31 joinder agreement unless written consent to the contrary is obtained from the  
32 fund manager.

1           B. City or town detention officers may participate in this plan if the  
2 governing body of the city or town enters into a joinder agreement with the  
3 fund manager to bring its detention officers into this plan. The joinder  
4 agreement shall be in accordance with the provisions of the plan. The  
5 governing body of the city or town shall designate all detention officers for  
6 membership in the plan unless written consent to the contrary is obtained  
7 from the fund manager.

8           C. Full-time dispatchers may participate in this plan if the governing  
9 body or agency of the employer of an eligible group as defined in  
10 section 38-842 enters into a joinder agreement with the fund manager to bring  
11 its full-time dispatchers into this plan **BEFORE THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS**  
12 **AMENDMENT TO THIS SECTION AND IF THE PERSON WAS EMPLOYED BY THE EMPLOYER AS A**  
13 **FULL-TIME DISPATCHER BEFORE THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS AMENDMENT TO THIS**  
14 **SECTION**. The joinder agreement shall be in accordance with the provisions of  
15 this plan and for those dispatchers designated for membership in the plan on  
16 the joinder date all credited service from any other Arizona defined benefit  
17 state retirement system or plan that represents credited service in a  
18 designated position shall be transferred to the corrections officer  
19 retirement plan. The governing body or agency of the employer shall  
20 designate all full-time dispatchers for membership in the plan except for a  
21 full-time dispatcher who signs an irrevocable agreement before the joinder  
22 agreement becomes effective electing not to become a member of the plan. A  
23 full-time dispatcher employed by an employer who becomes eligible for  
24 membership in the plan pursuant to this section may elect to participate in

27           D. Probation, surveillance and juvenile detention officers may  
28 participate in this plan if the administrative office of the courts enters

16 G. Before the execution of any joinder agreement each employer  
17 contemplating participation in the plan shall have an actuarial valuation  
18 made, which is payable by the employer, to determine the estimated cost of  
19 participation in accordance with section 38-894.

20 H. Assets under any existing public employee defined benefit  
21 retirement program, except a military retirement program, that are necessary  
22 to equal the actuarial present value of projected benefits to the extent  
23 funded on a market value basis as of the most recent actuarial valuation  
24 attributable to the employer's designated employee group, calculated using  
25 the actuarial methods and assumptions adopted by the existing public employee  
26 retirement program, shall be transferred from the program to this fund no  
27 later than ninety days after the employer's effective date. That portion of
