#### FACT SHEET FOR H.B. 2406

##### state computers; notice

##### Purpose

Requires, beginning July 1, 2015, budget unit computer users to accept the terms and conditions of using a state owned or leased computer prior to login.

##### Background

The Arizona Department of Administration (ADOA) is responsible for government information technology (IT) functions and is required to develop, implement and maintain a coordinated statewide IT plan. This includes the adoption of statewide technical, coordination and security standards for IT and the evaluation and approval of budget unit IT plans and projects (A.R.S. § 41-3504). The Statewide IT Security and Privacy Officer is required to develop, implement, maintain and ensure compliance by each budget unit with a coordinated statewide assurance plan for IT security and privacy (A.R.S. § 41-3507).

Statute defines *budget unit* as a department, commission, board, institution or other agency of the state receiving, expending or disbursing state funds or incurring obligations of the state, including the Arizona Board of Regents (ABOR) but excluding universities under the jurisdiction of ABOR, community college districts, and legislative or judicial branches (A.R.S. § 41-3501).

According to the fiscal note, H.B. 2406 will result in additional programming costs but due to a lack of comprehensive knowledge regarding the current status of the state's computer systems, any cost estimate would be speculative. However, ADOA has estimated a one-time cost of \$185,900 for existing staff to make adjustments to existing computer systems.

##### Provisions

1. Directs the ADOA Director to require budget units to provide a terms and conditions notice on every state owned or leased computer.
2. Requires computer users to accept the terms and conditions outlined in the notice before proceeding to login to the computer system.
3. Specifies the notice language must be substantially similar to language provided in statute.
4. Becomes effective on the general effective date.
