#### A BILL FOR AN ACT

CONCERNING A PREDICTIVE DATA ANALYTIC TECHNOLOGY FOR CHILD WELFARE PILOT PROGRAM.

## **Bill Summary**

(Note: This summary applies to this bill as introduced and does not reflect any amendments that may be subsequently adopted. The bill requires the department of human services (department) to develop, on or before September 1, 2016, a state-of-the-art data analytic system for child welfare pilot program (pilot program) to access, integrate, and analyze data sources for the purpose of calculating a child's risk for abuse or neglect. The pilot program must be able to integrate data from various state and county sources, use various types of technology to

accurately and precisely calculate child risk scores, and provide mechanisms to alert and assist caseworkers to changes in the environment of a child at risk.

The department shall report to the health and human services committee of the senate and the public health care and human services committee of the house of representatives, or any successor committees, on the progress and status of the pilot program.

1 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado: 2 **SECTION 1.** In Colorado Revised Statutes, **add** article 5.1 to title 3 26 as follows: 4 ARTICLE 5.1 5 **Implementation Plan for a Predictive Data Analytic** 6 **System for Child Welfare** 7 26-5.1-101. Legislative declaration. (1) THE GENERAL 8 ASSEMBLY FINDS AND DECLARES THAT: 9 (a) CHILD ABUSE AND NEGLECT IS A CRISIS THAT AFFECTS THE 10 SAFETY AND WELFARE OF VULNERABLE CHILDREN ON GLOBAL, NATIONAL, 11 STATE, AND COUNTY LEVELS; 12 (b) IN THE UNITED STATES ALONE, MORE THAN ONE THOUSAND 13 FIVE HUNDRED CHILDREN DIE EACH YEAR AS A DIRECT RESULT OF ABUSE 14 OR NEGLECT; 15 (c) IN COLORADO BETWEEN 2007 AND 2012, ONE HUNDRED 16 SEVENTY-FIVE CHILDREN DIED AS A DIRECT RESULT OF ABUSE OR 17 NEGLECT: 18 (d) INFORMATION EXISTS IN STATE AND COUNTY DATABASES THAT 19 CAN HELP DETERMINE WHICH INDIVIDUALS MIGHT HAVE ACCESS TO A 20 CHILD AND THE RISKS THOSE INDIVIDUALS POSE TO THE CHILD; 21 (e) Modern technologies and best practices exist, and 22 HAVE BEEN UTILIZED SUCCESSFULLY IN OTHER STATES, THAT CAN ACCESS,

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1	INTEGRATE, AND ANALYZE DATA ABOUT A CHILD AND HIS OR HER
2	ENVIRONMENT IN NEAR REAL TIME TO PROVIDE A MORE TIMELY

8	HAVE THE MOST IMMEDIATE NEED FOR INTERVENTIONS, THUS BETTER
9	EQUIPPING CASEWORKERS TO PREVENT TRAGIC OUTCOMES; AND
10	(g) Providing appropriate, user-friendly tools and
11	TECHNOLOGY TO CASEWORKERS CAN DRAMATICALLY IMPROVE
12	OUTCOMES, INCREASE PRODUCTIVITY, AND REDUCE EMPLOYEE TURNOVER
13	RESULTING FROM BURNOUT, STRESS, AND FRUSTRATION.
14	(2) THEREFORE, THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY DECLARES THAT IT IS IN
15	THE BEST INTERESTS OF THE CHILDREN OF COLORADO TO ESTABLISH AN
16	IMPLEMENTATION PLAN FOR A STATE-OF-THE-ART PREDICTIVE DATA
17	ANALYTIC SYSTEM FOR CHILD WELFARE THAT IS COMPATIBLE WITH THE
18	COLORADO CHILD WELFARE MANAGEMENT SYSTEM AND THE STATE'S
19	INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY ENVIRONMENT.
20	26-5.1-102. Predictive data analytic technology for child
21	welfare pilot program - steering committee - requirements -
22	independent vendor - reporting. (1) (a) ON OR BEFORE DECEMBER 15,
23	2016, USING THE RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE STEERING COMMITTEE
24	FORMED IN PARAGRAPH (b) OF THIS SUBSECTION (1), THE STATE
25	DEPARTMENT SHALL RELEASE A REQUEST FOR PROPOSALS FOR A
26	TECHNOLOGY VENDOR FOR A PREDICTIVE DATA ANALYTIC TECHNOLOGY
27	FOR CHILD WELFARE PILOT PROGRAM, REFERRED TO IN THIS ARTICLE AS

24	(b) ADVANCED MATCHING AND ENTITY RESOLUTION TO
25	ACCURATELY MERGE DATA FROM DIFFERENT DATABASES;
26	(c) ADVANCED SOCIAL NETWORK OR LINK ANALYSIS TO
2.7	DETERMINE BOTH KNOWN AND HIDDEN RELATIONSHIPS THAT THE CHILD

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1	MAY HAVE WITH OTHER PEOPLE;
2	(d) USE OF THE LATEST ADVANCED ANALYTICAL TECHNIQUES,
3	INCLUDING PREDICTIVE MODELING; COMPLEX PATTERN ANALYSIS; SOCIAL
4	NETWORK ANALYSIS; TEXT MINING; AND GEOSPATIAL ANALYSIS, TO MORE
5	ACCURATELY AND PRECISELY CALCULATE CHILD RISK SCORES;
6	(e) THE ABILITY TO REGULARLY MONITOR DATA SOURCES TO
7	AUTOMATICALLY IDENTIFY CHANGES TO A CHILD'S ENVIRONMENT AND
8	RECALCULATE THE CHILD'S RISK ACCORDINGLY;
9	(f) AN ALERTING MECHANISM THAT NOTIFIES CASEWORKERS WHEN
10	CHILD RISK FACTORS EXCEED PRESET TOLERANCE LEVELS;
11	(g) AN INTUITIVE USER INTERFACE FOR CASEWORKERS TO EASILY
12	PRIORITIZE AND VISUALIZE CASES AND RELATED INFORMATION ABOUT THE
13	CHILD AND HIS OR HER ENVIRONMENT; AND
14	(h) THE ABILITY FOR FEEDBACK AND SELF-LEARNING THAT
15	CAPTURES OUTCOMES AND UTILIZES THE INFORMATION TO IMPROVE
16	ANALYTIC ACCURACY OVER TIME.
17	(3) AT THE CONCLUSION OF THE REQUEST FOR PROPOSALS PROCESS
18	DEVELOPED PURSUANT TO SUBSECTION (1) OF THIS SECTION, THE STATE
19	DEPARTMENT SHALL SELECT AND ENTER INTO A VENDOR CONTRACT FOR
20	THE PILOT PROGRAM IN AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED FIVE HUNDRED
21	THOUSAND DOLLARS WITH A TECHNOLOGY VENDOR WITH EXPERIENCE IN
22	IMPLEMENTING DATA ANALYTICS TECHNOLOGY TO ACCESS, INTEGRATE,
23	AND ANALYZE ENTERPRISE HUMAN SERVICES DATA TO CALCULATE RISK
24	SCORES. THE TECHNOLOGY VENDOR SELECTED SHALL ENSURE AND
25	CERTIFY ITS COMPLIANCE WITH ALL RELEVANT STATE AND FEDERAL
26	PRIVACY LAWS AND POLICIES.
27	(4) Unless otherwise precluded by state or federal

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1	STATUTE OR RULES OR REGULATIONS, STATE AGENCIES SHALL MAKE THEIR
2	DATA AVAILABLE TO THE STATE DEPARTMENT FOR THE SPECIFIC PURPOSE
3	OF THE PILOT PROGRAM. DATA SHARING AGREEMENTS OR MEMORANDA OF
4	UNDERSTANDING MUST BE EXECUTED BETWEEN AGENCIES TO PROTECT
5	THE PRIVACY AND CONFIDENTIALITY OF THE DATA.
6	26-5.1-103. Reporting and recommendations. (1) ON OR
7	BEFORE MARCH 31, 2017, AND EVERY QUARTER THEREAFTER UNLESS
8	OTHERWISE DIRECTED BY THE COMMITTEE CHAIRS, THE STATE
9	DEPARTMENT SHALL SUBMIT A WRITTEN REPORT TO THE HEALTH AND
10	HUMAN SERVICES COMMITTEE OF THE SENATE AND THE PUBLIC HEALTH
11	CARE AND HUMAN SERVICES COMMITTEE OF THE HOUSE OF
12	REPRESENTATIVES, OR ANY SUCCESSOR COMMITTEES, ON THE PROGRESS
13	AND STATUS OF THE PILOT PROGRAM. THE REPORT MUST INCLUDE, AT A
14	MINIMUM:
15	(a) THE OVERALL PILOT PROGRAM STATUS, MILESTONES, AND
16	BUDGETARY REPORTS;
17	(b) THE DATA SOURCES THAT HAVE BEEN INCORPORATED, AS WELL
18	AS ADDITIONAL DATA SOURCES THAT WOULD ADD VALUE TO THE OVERALL
19	GOALS OF THE PILOT PROGRAM;
20	(c) ANALYTICAL RESULTS AND ACCURACY;
21	(d) EXAMPLES OF CASE INTERVENTIONS;
22	(e) PRODUCTIVITY IMPROVEMENTS; AND
23	(f) AGENCY PROCEDURAL CHANGES OR BEST PRACTICES
24	IDENTIFIED BY THE PILOT PROGRAM.
25	(2) At the conclusion of the pilot program, the state
26	DEPARTMENT SHALL, IN ADDITION TO THE QUARTERLY REPORTING
27	REQUIRED PURSUANT TO SUBSECTION (1) OF THIS SECTION, AND AFTER

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1	REVIEW BY AN INDEPENDENT THIRD-PARTY EVALUATOR, PROVIDE A
2	RECOMMENDATION, PLAN, AND COST ESTIMATE FOR A STATEWIDE
3	IMPLEMENTATION OF THE PILOT PROGRAM.
4	26-5.1-104. Repeal. This article is repealed, effective
5	January 1, 2018.
6	SECTION 2. Safety clause. The general assembly hereby finds,
7	determines, and declares that this act is necessary for the immediate
8	preservation of the public peace, health, and safety.

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
