Amend House Bill 3071 by replacing everything after the enacting clause with the following: 3 "Section 5. The School Code is amended by changing 4 Sections 2-3.62, 27-9.1, and 27-9.2 as follows: 5 6 (105 ILCS 5/2-3.62) (from Ch. 122, par. 2-3.62) 7 Sec. 2-3.62. Educational service centers. (a) A regional network of educational service centers 8 shall be established by the State Board of Education to 9 10 coordinate and combine existing services in a manner which is practical and efficient and to provide new services to schools 11 12 as provided in this Section. Services to be made available by 13 such centers shall include the planning, implementation and evaluation of: 14

(2) computer technology education;

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1 (3) mathematics, science and reading resources for 2 teachers including continuing education, inservice 3 training and staff development.

The centers may provide training, technical assistance, coordination and planning in other program areas such as school improvement, school accountability, financial planning, consultation, and services, career guidance, early childhood education, alcohol/drug education and prevention, family life - sexual health sex education, electronic transmission of data from school districts to the State, alternative education and regional special education, and telecommunications systems that provide distance learning. Such telecommunications systems may be obtained through the Department of Central Management Services pursuant to Section 405-270 of Department of Central Management Services Law (20 405/405-270). The programs and services of educational service centers may be offered to private school teachers and private school students within each service center area provided public schools have already been afforded adequate access to such programs and services.

Upon the abolition of the office, removal from office, disqualification for office, resignation from office, or expiration of the current term of office of the regional superintendent of schools, whichever is earlier, the chief administrative officer of the centers serving that portion of a Class II county school unit outside of a city of 500,000 or

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more inhabitants shall have and exercise, in and with respect to each educational service region having a population of 2,000,000 or more inhabitants and in and with respect to each school district located in any such educational service region, all of the rights, powers, duties, and responsibilities theretofore vested by law in and exercised and performed by the regional superintendent of schools for that area under the provisions of this Code or any other laws of this State.

The State Board of Education shall promulgate rules and regulations necessary to implement this Section. The rules shall include detailed standards which delineate the scope and specific content of programs to be provided by each Educational Service Center, as well as the specific planning, implementation and evaluation services to be provided by each Center relative to its programs. The Board shall also provide the standards by which it will evaluate the programs provided by each Center.

(b) Centers serving Class 1 county school units shall be governed by an 11-member board, 3 members of which shall be public school teachers nominated by the local bargaining representatives to the appropriate regional superintendent for appointment and no more than 3 members of which shall be from each of the following categories, including but not limited to superintendents, regional superintendents, school board members and a representative of an institution of higher

- 1 education. The members of the board shall be appointed by the
- 2 regional superintendents whose school districts are served by
- 3 the educational service center. The composition of the board
- 4 will reflect the revisions of this amendatory Act of 1989 as
- 5 the terms of office of current members expire.
- 6 (c) The centers shall be of sufficient size and number to
- 7 assure delivery of services to all local school districts in
- 8 the State.
- 9 (d) From monies appropriated for this program the State
- 10 Board of Education shall provide grants paid from the Personal
- 11 Property Tax Replacement Fund to qualifying Educational
- 12 Service Centers applying for such grants in accordance with
- 13 rules and regulations promulgated by the State Board of
- 14 Education to implement this Section.
- 15 (e) The governing authority of each of the 18 regional
- 16 educational service centers shall appoint a family life -
- 17 <u>sexual health</u> <del>sex</del> education advisory board consisting of 2
- parents, 2 teachers, 2 school administrators, 2 school board
- 19 members, 2 health care professionals, one library system
- 20 representative, and the director of the regional educational
- 21 service center who shall serve as chairperson of the advisory
- 22 board so appointed. Members of the family life sexual health
- 23 sex education advisory boards shall serve without
- 24 compensation. Each of the advisory boards appointed pursuant
- 25 to this subsection shall develop a plan for regional

The regional superintendents of 14 15 schools elected by the voters residing in all Class I counties 16 shall serve as the chief administrators for these programs and 17 services.

- 22 (a) In this Section:
- 23 "Abstinence" means not engaging in oral, vaginal, or anal
- intercourse or genital skin-to-skin contact.
- 25 "Adapt" means to modify an evidence-based or

1 evidence-informed program model for use with a particular
2 demographic, ethnic, linguistic, or cultural group.

"Age appropriate" means suitable to particular ages or age groups of children and adolescents, based on the developing cognitive, emotional, and behavioral capacity typical for the age or age group.

"Anatomy and physiology" means that information that provides a foundation for understanding basic human functioning.

"Characteristics of effective programs" means the aspects of evidence-based programs, including the development, content, and implementation of such programs, that (i) have been shown to be effective in terms of increasing knowledge, clarifying values and attitudes, increasing skills, and impacting behavior and (ii) are widely recognized by leading medical and public health agencies to be effective in changing sexual behaviors that lead to sexually transmitted infections, including HIV, unintended pregnancy, and dating violence and sexual assault among young people.

"Comprehensive" means essential information in the National Sex Education Standards topic strands that includes, but is not limited to, content related to anatomy and physiology; healthy relationships; identity; personal safety; pregnancy and reproduction; puberty, growth, and adolescent development; and sexually transmitted infections, including HIV.

1	"Consent" means an affirmative, knowing, conscious,
2	ongoing, and voluntary agreement to engage in interpersonal,
3	physical, or sexual activity, which can be revoked at any
4	point, including during the course of interpersonal, physical,
5	or sexual activity.
6	"Culturally appropriate" means affirming culturally
7	diverse individuals, families, and communities in an
8	inclusive, respectful, and effective manner, including
9	materials and instruction that are inclusive of race,
10	ethnicity, language, cultural background, religion, gender,
11	gender identity, gender expression, sexual orientation, sexual
12	behavior, and different abilities.
13	"Evidence-based program" means a program for which
14	systematic, empirical research or evaluation has provided
15	evidence of effectiveness.
16	"Evidence-informed program" means a program that uses the
17	best available research and practice knowledge to guide
18	program design and implementation.
19	"Healthy relationships" means that information that helps
20	pupils learn how to identify healthy and unhealthy
21	relationship behaviors and helps pupils develop the skills to
22	navigate changing relationships among family, peers, and
23	partners free from shame and stigma.
24	"Identity" means that information that addresses several
25	fundamental aspects of people's understanding of how they
26	identify their sexual orientation, gender, gender identity, or

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gender expression without stereotypes, shame, or stigma.

"Personal safety" means that information that helps pupils develop an awareness about and the skills and confidence to respond to discrimination, bullying, harassment, including sexual harassment, sexual abuse, sexual assault, intimate partner violence, incest, rape, and sex trafficking and the role that schools play in creating learning environments that promote personal safety.

"Pre-exposure Prophylaxis (PrEP)" means medications approved by the federal Food and Drug Administration and recommended by the United States Public Health Service or the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention for HIV pre-exposure prophylaxis and related pre-exposure prophylaxis services, including, but not limited to, HIV and sexually transmitted infection screening, treatment for sexually transmitted infections, medical monitoring, laboratory services, and sexual health counseling, to reduce the likelihood of HIV infection for individuals who are not living with HIV but are vulnerable to HIV exposure.

"Pregnancy and reproduction" means that information that addresses how pregnancy happens, informed decision-making to avoid unintended pregnancy through abstinence and contraception, prenatal practices and resources that support a healthy pregnancy; and information that helps pupils understand resources and laws related to pregnancy, adoption, abortion, and parenting.

1	"Post-exposure Prophylaxis (PeP)" means the medications
2	that are recommended by the federal Centers for Disease
3	Control and Prevention and other public health authorities to
4	help prevent HIV infection after potential occupational or
5	non-occupational HIV exposure.
6	Puberty, growth, and adolescent development" means that
7	information that addresses a pivotal milestone for every
8	person that has an impact on cognitive, emotional, physical,
9	sexual and social development.
10	"Sexually transmitted infections, including HIV" means
11	that information that provides both content and skills for
12	understanding scientifically accepted methods of how to
13	prevent and avoid exposure to sexually transmitted infections
14	(STIs), including HIV, through abstinence, condoms,
15	vaccination, Pre-exposure Prophylaxis (PrEP), and
16	Post-exposure Prophylaxis (PEP), including how they are
17	transmitted, their signs, symptoms, and options for screening,
18	testing, and treatment, and other medical care.
19	"Medically accurate" means verified or supported by the
20	weight of research conducted in compliance with accepted
21	scientific methods and published in peer-reviewed journals, if
22	applicable, or comprising information recognized as accurate,
23	objective, and complete.
24	"Unintended pregnancy" means a pregnancy that is unplanned
25	or unwanted (that is, the pregnancy occurred when no children

or no more children were desired or the pregnancy occurred

## earlier than desired).

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- (a-5) No pupil shall be required to take or participate in any class or course in comprehensive sexual health sex education if that pupil's his parent or guardian submits written objection thereto, and refusal to take or participate in such course or program shall not be reason for suspension or expulsion of such pupil. Each class or course in comprehensive sex education offered in any of grades 6 through 12 shall include instruction on both abstinence and contraception for the prevention of pregnancy and sexually transmitted diseases, including HIV/AIDS. Nothing in this Section prohibits instruction in sanitation, hygiene or traditional courses in biology.
- (b) (Blank). All public school classes that teach sex education and discuss sexual intercourse in grades 6 through 12 shall emphasize that abstinence from sexual intercourse is a responsible and positive decision and is the only protection that is 100% effective against unwanted teenage pregnancy, sexually transmitted diseases, and acquired immune deficiency syndrome (AIDS) when transmitted sexually.
- (c) All classes that teach <u>sexual health</u> <del>sex</del> education <del>and</del> <del>discuss sexual intercourse in grades 6 through 12</del> shall satisfy the following criteria:
- 24 (1) Course material and instruction shall be
  25 <u>culturally</u>, developmentally, and age appropriate,
  26 medically accurate, and comprehensive <del>complete</del>.

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(1.5) Course material and instruction shall replicate or evidence-informed programs evidence-based substantially incorporate elements of evidence-based programs or evidence-informed programs or characteristics of effective programs.

(1.10) On or before August 1, 2022, the State Board of Education, in consultation with youth, parents, sexual health and interpersonal violence prevention experts, health care providers, and advocates and education practitioners, including, but not limited to, administrators, regional superintendents of schools, teachers, and school support personnel, shall develop and adopt rigorous learning standards in the area of sexual health education, which, at a minimum, must comply with all of the National Sex Education Standards: Second Edition as authored by the Future of Sex Education. As the National Sex Education Standards are updated, the State Board of Education shall update these learning standards.

- (2) (Blank). Course material and instruction shall teach honor and respect for monogamous marriage.
- (3) (Blank). Course material and instruction shall place substantial emphasis on both abstinence, including abstinence until marriage, and contraception for the prevention of pregnancy and sexually transmitted diseases among youth and shall stress that abstinence is the

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ensured method of avoiding unintended pregnancy, sexually transmitted diseases, and HIV/AIDS.

- (4) (Blank). Course material and instruction shall include a discussion of the possible emotional and psychological consequences of preadolescent and adolescent sexual intercourse and the consequences of unwanted adolescent pregnancy.
- (5) (Blank). Course material and instruction shall stress that sexually transmitted diseases are serious possible hazards of sexual intercourse. Pupils shall be provided with statistics based on the latest medical information citing the failure and success rates of condoms in preventing AIDS and other sexually transmitted diseases.
- (6) (Blank). Course material and instruction shall advise pupils of the laws pertaining to their financial responsibility to children born in and out of wedlock.
- (7) (Blank). Course material and instruction shall advise pupils of the circumstances under which it is unlawful for a person to have sexual relations with an individual who is under the age of 17 and for a person who is in a position of trust, authority, or supervision to have sexual relations with an individual who is under the age of 18 pursuant to Article 11 of the Criminal Code of 2012
  - (8) (Blank). Course material and instruction shall

constitute consent.

teach pupils to not make unwanted physical and verbal

25	health care; parenting resources; substance abuse

14	FDA-approved treatment and options.

16	medically inaccurate or include information that is
17	scientifically shown to be ineffective.
18	(16) Course material and instruction may not reflect
19	or promote bias against any person on the basis of the
20	person's race, ethnicity, language, cultural background,
21	religion, HIV status, gender, gender identity, gender
22	expression, sexual orientation, sexual behavior, or

25	insensitive and unresponsive to the needs of pupils based

11	(20) Course material and instruction shall be
12	sensitive and responsive to the needs of pupils with an

16	and sequence of instructional materials to be used in such

18	(e) The State Board of Education shall make available

for educating children regarding sex education and may take

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into consideration the curriculum on this subject developed by other states, as well as any other curricular materials suggested by education experts and other groups that work on sex education issues. Materials may include, without limitation, model sexual health <del>sex</del> education resources curriculums and sexual health education programs. The State Board of Education shall make these resource materials available on its Internet website, in a clearly identified and easily accessible place. School districts that do not currently provide sexual health sex education are not required to teach sexual health sex education. If a sex education class or course is offered in any of grades 6 through 12, the school district Schools may choose and adapt the culturally, developmentally, and age-appropriate, medically accurate, evidence-based or evidence-informed, and comprehensive sexual <u>health</u> <del>complete sex</del> education curriculum that meets the specific needs of its community.

(f) The State Board of Education shall, through existing reporting mechanisms, if available, direct each school district to identify, if instruction on sexual health education is provided, whether the instruction was provided by a teacher in the school, a consultant, or a community group; the number of pupils receiving instruction; the number of pupils excused from instruction; and the duration of instruction and shall report the results of this inquiry to the General Assembly annually for a period of 5 years

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procedure for evaluating and measuring the effectiveness of the family life courses of instruction in each local school district, including the setting of reasonable and equitable goals for improved sexual health outcomes, such as reduced instances and disparities of sexually transmitted infections (STI), including HIV, increased instances of STI screening and treatment, including for HIV, especially in community areas with high STI, including HIV, diagnoses rates, and decreased instances and disparities of sexual assault and unintended pregnancy. reduced sexual activity, sexually transmitted diseases and premarital pregnancy. The goals shall be set by the beginning of the 1991-92 school year. The Superintendent shall distribute a copy of the procedure to each local school district. Each local school district may develop additional procedures or methods for measuring the effectiveness of the family life courses of instruction within the district. Before the beginning of the 1993 94 school year, the State Superintendent shall collect and evaluate all relevant data to determine whether the goals are being achieved.

22 Section 10. The Critical Health Problems and Comprehensive 23 Health Education Act is amended by changing Section 3 as 24 follows:

1 (105 ILCS 110/3)

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Sec. 3. Comprehensive Health Education Program. program established under this Act shall include, but not be limited to, the following major educational areas as a basis for curricula in all elementary and secondary schools in this State: human ecology and health, human growth and development, the emotional, psychological, physiological, hygienic, and social responsibilities of family life, culturally, developmentally, and age-appropriate, medically accurate, and evidence-based or evidence-informed information regarding including sexual abstinence until marriage, prevention and control of disease, including instruction in grades 6 through 12 on the prevention, transmission, and treatment of sexually transmitted infections, including HIV/AIDS spread of AIDS, age-appropriate sexual abuse and assault awareness and prevention education in grades pre-kindergarten through 12, public and environmental health, consumer health, safety education and disaster survival, mental health and illness, personal health habits, alcohol and, drug use, and abuse, including the medical and legal ramifications of alcohol, drug, and tobacco use, abuse during pregnancy, evidence-based and medically accurate information regarding sexual abstinence, tobacco, nutrition, and dental health. The instruction on mental health and illness must evaluate the multiple dimensions of health by reviewing the relationship between physical and mental health so as to enhance student

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understanding, attitudes, and behaviors that promote health, well-being, and human dignity. The program shall also provide course material and instruction to advise pupils of the Abandoned Newborn Infant Protection Act. The program shall medically accurate information include about including, without limitation, types of cancer, signs and symptoms, risk factors, the importance of early prevention and detection, and information on where to go for Notwithstanding the above educational areas, the following areas may also be included as a basis for curricula in all elementary and secondary schools in this State: basic first to, aid (including, but not limited cardiopulmonary resuscitation and the Heimlich maneuver), heart disease, diabetes, stroke, the prevention of child abuse, neglect, and suicide, and teen dating violence in grades 7 through 12. Beginning with the 2014-2015 school year, training on how to properly administer cardiopulmonary resuscitation training must be in accordance with standards of the American Red Cross, the American Heart Association, or another nationally recognized certifying organization) and how to use an automated external defibrillator shall be included as a basis for curricula in all secondary schools in this State.

The school board of each public elementary and secondary school in the State shall encourage all teachers and other school personnel to acquire, develop, and maintain the knowledge and skills necessary to properly administer

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life-saving techniques, including, without limitation, the Heimlich maneuver and rescue breathing. The training shall be in accordance with standards of the American Red Cross, the American Heart Association, or another nationally recognized certifying organization. A school board may use the services of non-governmental entities whose personnel have expertise in life-saving techniques to instruct teachers and other school personnel in these techniques. Each school board is encouraged to have in its employ, or on its volunteer staff, at least one person who is certified, by the American Red Cross or by another qualified certifying agency, as qualified to administer first aid and cardiopulmonary resuscitation. In addition, each school board is authorized to allocate appropriate portions of its institute or inservice days to conduct training programs for teachers and other school personnel who have expressed an interest in becoming qualified aid or administer emergency first cardiopulmonary resuscitation. School boards are urged to encourage their teachers and other school personnel who coach school athletic programs and other extracurricular school activities to acquire, develop, and maintain the knowledge and skills necessary to properly administer first aid and cardiopulmonary resuscitation in accordance with standards and requirements established by the American Red Cross or another qualified certifying agency. Subject to appropriation, the State Board of Education shall establish and administer a matching grant

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program to pay for half of the cost that a school district incurs in training those teachers and other school personnel who express an interest in becoming qualified to administer cardiopulmonary resuscitation (which training must be in accordance with standards of the American Red Cross, the American Heart Association, or another nationally recognized certifying organization) or in learning how to use an automated external defibrillator. A school district that applies for a grant must demonstrate that it has funds to pay half of the cost of the training for which matching grant money is sought. The State Board of Education shall award the grants on a first-come, first-serve basis.

No pupil shall be required to take or participate in any class or course on <a href="HIV/AIDS">HIV/AIDS</a> at a family life instruction or to receive training on how to properly administer cardiopulmonary resuscitation or how to use an automated external defibrillator if <a href="the-pupil's his or her">the pupil's his or her</a> parent or guardian submits written objection thereto, and refusal to take or participate in the course or program or the training shall not be reason for suspension or expulsion of the pupil.

Curricula developed under programs established in accordance with this Act in the major educational area of alcohol and drug use and abuse shall include classroom instruction in grades 5 through 12. The instruction, which shall include matters relating to both the physical and legal effects and ramifications of drug and substance abuse, shall

- be integrated into existing curricula; and the State Board of 2 Education shall develop and make available to all elementary and secondary schools in this State instructional materials 3 4 and guidelines which will assist the schools in incorporating 5 the instruction into their existing curricula. In addition, 6 school districts may offer, as part of existing curricula
- during the school day or as part of an after school program, 7
- support services and instruction for pupils or pupils whose 8
- 9 parent, parents, or guardians are chemically dependent.
